**Innovations** (28)- a new idea or product.


*“It was in the North sea in the late nineteenth century that **innovations** in fishing took place.”*

**Beam trawler** (29)- a special netting system, used to catch more fish. The net is dragged behind the boat from a large beam or pole.

*“ It was the British that first started using a **beam trawler** in the 14th century. Also called a “wondrychoum,” this was a net suspended from a beam and dragged through the sea.”*

**Well boats** (30)- a boat that has a big tank in the middle of it that could hold water and fish thus keeping the fish fresh longer.

*“ Well boats came into use. These were ships that contained a tank of seawater into which the caught fish would be dumped, enabling fish to stay fresh longer than previously. “*

**Teeming** (32)- large amounts


